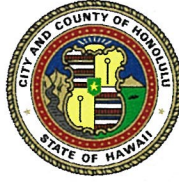

**RE: ALL-DIGITAL TRANSITION OF OCEANIC TIME WARNER CABLE LLC'S OAHU  
CABLE SYSTEM, NOTICE OF CHANGES TO PEG CHANNEL LINEUP AND FORMAT**

Dear Mr. Schott:

This is to respectfully request your reconsideration on the matter below. We understand that as part of its digital migration, Charter is relocating `Ōlelo's Public, Education and Government (PEG) access programs to different channel designations as of February 6, 2018 and relocating the PEG channels on the neighbor islands in the near future. This relocation is clearly not in the best interest of the City and County of Honolulu and the State.

`Ōlelo Community Media has served the residents of Oahu for over 28 years with local origination programming that is unique to our island communities. They have done an excellent job in branding their current channels in such a way that ensures that local community programming engages residents and is integral to civic awareness within our island community. `Ōlelo's efforts to provide unique local programming would be irreparably harmed by suddenly changing the location of the channels.

For state and county government, `Ōlelo brings unfiltered government transparency to the community. Residents can view neighborhood board meetings, City Council meetings and hearings, and Honolulu Authority for Rapid Transit (HART) board meetings in their entirety – uncut and unedited. Witnessing government first hand and the creation of an informed public is increasingly important in this age of fake news and distrust in government.

Moreover, we understand that Charter proposes to relocate the current PEG channels to 181 through 187 (including the current two VOD channels 50 and 52) that would not be viewable by customers using a digital transport adapter (channels 2-99 only). This would prevent viewers from accessing `Ōlelo's channels. We also understand that the local broadcast stations, including the public broadcast station, will retain their current channel designations in both digital and high definition formats. Thus we see no reason why `Ōlelo's channels need to be relocated at all.


